## HORTICULTURAL SHOW GENERAL RULES & CONDITIONS

1. All entry forms, with the appropriate fee, to be handed to anyone listed on the inside front cover.
2. All entry forms must be with the Show Secretary by **8pm on Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> August**.
3. Exhibits can be staged between 7pm & 9pm on Friday & between 8.30am & 11.25am on Show day.
4. Judging commences at 11.30am. Only Judges and Stewards will be allowed in the Hall during judging. The Judges' decisions are final.
5. Where possible judging will be to the rules of RHS, NCS, NDS, NAFA, BFS and NHS.
6. In any class, prizes will be awarded at the Judge's discretion. No trophy or medal will be awarded unless a First Prize is given.
7. Points for 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup> and Highly Commended are 5, 3, 2 and 1. In the event of a tie, the trophy will go to the one with the **most firsts**.
8. No competitor to make more than one entry in any single class unless otherwise stated.
9. The Committee reserves the right to visit, before or after the Show, the ground from which any exhibit has been entered for competition.
10. The Committee reserves the right to refuse any entry without being required to give any reason or explanation. The decision of the Committee shall be final on all questions in connection with the Show and the completion of any entry form shall imply acceptance of these conditions.
11. Any protest must be made, in writing, to the Show Secretary (with a deposit of

£1.00) by 3pm on the day of the Show. The deposit will be refunded if the protest is upheld.

12. The winners of the Trophies in 2009 **must return them in a clean condition** to the Show Secretary by 1<sup>st</sup> July 2010.
13. All horticultural exhibits are to be grown by the exhibitor, except flowers, etc. for Flower Arranging which may be purchased.
14. All domestic exhibits are to be home made.
15. Handicraft exhibits must not have been previously exhibited at this show.
16. All classes are in open competition, exception class 1.
17. **NOVICE** - for the purpose of this schedule, will be a person who has never won a Trophy, medal or first prize for that kind of exhibit previous to this year
18. Your entry may be auctioned at the conclusion of the Show. If you do not want it auctioned please strike out the "for auction" stamp on your class card(s).

This medal is offered to the winner of the largest amount of money prizes in the Horticultural Classes, ie Sections A, B, C and D, classes 2-75 inclusive. In the event of a tie, the first in alphabetical order receives the Medal unless he/she has previously won the Medal and the other has not. The Medal cannot be awarded twice in three years to the same person.

General Information for entrants:	All entries will be viewed and judged from the front. Each exhibit will be allowed a space of 76cms (2'6") wide x 61cms (2') deep x 76cms (2'6") high, unless otherwise stated in the requirements for each Class. The tables provided for the staging of entries will be covered with a pale sage matt finish fabric. The same fabric will also be used to provide a backdrop for each exhibit. There will not be any partitions between exhibits.
Natural Plant Material:	includes fresh, dried, garden, wild or made up plant material, flower foliage, fruit and vegetables. All may be additionally coloured.
Fresh Plant Material:	means living plants and material cut from living plants and should be in water or water-retaining material. Exception: any long-lasting plant material which will remain turgid for the duration of the Show.
Driftwood:	any bark, branch, wood or root in a dry condition excluding seedpods and spathes.
Modern Exhibit:	includes Free Form, Free Style, Contemporary, Modern Line, Modern Mass and Abstract Designs.
Exhibit:	an exhibit is composed of natural plant material with or without accessories.
An Accessory:	is anything other than plant material used as part of the exhibit, except bases, containers and drapes.
Bases and drapes:	if used are considered to be part of the exhibit & all drapes should be free standing.
Open Staging:	Width 76cm (2' 6"), Height 76cm (2' 6"), Depth 61cm (2') unless otherwise stated.
All Exhibits:	to be judged in accordance with NAFAS Competition Manual, First Edition 2001.

**BOILED CAKE** 8 ozs self raising flour, pinch of salt, 12 ozs mixed fruit, 1 beaten egg, 4 ozs butter or margarine, 4 ozs soft brown sugar,  $\frac{1}{4}$  pint of water. Put the fruit, sugar, butter or margarine in a pan and simmer for 20 minutes. Leave to cool. Add beaten egg and stir in the sieved flour. Turn the mixture into a greased 6 " tin. Bake in a moderate oven for approximately  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hours at Gas mark 4 (350° F/170°-180°C)

**GINGER CAKE** (use 8 inch round tin). 8 ozs self raising flour, 6 ozs or 3 tablespoon golden syrup, 3 ozs soft brown sugar, 1 teaspoon ground ginger, 4 ozs margarine,  $\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoon bicarbonate of soda,  $\frac{1}{8}$ th pint milk and 1 large egg. Melt syrup, brown sugar and margarine. Cool. Sieve flour and mix with bicarbonate and combine with syrup mixture and egg. Fill greased and lined tin with the mixture and place in oven at Gas mark 4 (350°F /170° -180°C) for approximately 45 minutes.
